



"S EVE" (PG-13):

"New Year's Eve" is the second in a remarkably shallow series of holidaythemed, celebrity-stuffed confections from director Garry Marshall and screenwriter Katherine Fugate, following their 2010 "Valentine's Day" collaboration. Many of the elements are the same as they were for "Valentine's Day," just moved back on the calendar a few weeks, with the script again weaving together a dozen or so plotlines that crisscross a holiday prone to getting sentimentalized.

"SHAME" (NC-17): Despite the ado about its NC-17 rating, this is the leastsexy movie about sex you will ever see. Michael Fassbender lays himself bare, literally and metaphorically, as a sex addict prowling an increasingly dark and dangerous New York City. But there's nothing titillating about the often graphic interludes in which his character, Brandon, engages; they grow more desperate, animalistic and unsatisfying — for everyone involved — as the film spirals toward its overwhelming conclusion.

"SHERLOCK HOLMES: A GAME OF SHADOWS" (PG-13): Very little was subtle about "Sherlock Holmes," director Guy Ritchie's 2009 steampunk take on the iconic character. The good news is that the inevitable sequel - "Sherlock Holmes: A Game of Shadows" - is even more entertaining. The overblown fight scenes and big bangs are still around; the plot doesn't make any more sense than the original's; and the playful, homoerotic subtext is downright pervasive. But the game is now afoot with Holmes' arch-nemesis, Professor James Moriarity -- and that makes a notable difference.

"WAR HORSE" (PG-13): Steven Spielberg directs this World War I epic that tells the story of a friendship between a horse and a young Englishman. When the horse is forced into service with the British military, it begins a journey through the horrors of war as the horse tries to return to its home.

"WE BOUGHT A ZOO" (PG): Cameron Crowe directs this true story about a single father who decides his family needs a fresh start - and ends up buying a dilapidated zoo. Matt Damon, Scarlett Johansson, Thomas Haden Church and Elle Fanning star.

Buy It: "Lovers After All, " Deborah Winters, Jazzed Media, www.jazzedmedia. com, \$14.99.

Elvin Bishop: Bishop's enduring appeal is that of the good-time bluesman, and you can hear the good times rolling on "Raisin' Hell Revue," a rollicking live CD recorded last year on one of the Legendary Rhythm and Blues Cruises.

A longtime resident of San Geronimo Valley, Bishop shares lead vocals with John Nemeth, a bright young star on the blues scene; veteran Finis Tasby, formerly of Freddie King's band; and his battle-tested bandmate, saxophonist Terry Hanck.

An intelligent musician with a social conscience, Bishop isn't all fun and games, and he gets serious with his torn-from-theheadlines tune "What the

Maria Muldaur: Our own Mill Valley diva returned to her beloved New Orleans to record "Steady Love," a mix of the sacred and the profane, seamlessly blending soul-stirring spiritual/gospel songs into her signature gumbo of electric blues and swamp funk. For these sessions, Muldaur enlists some of Crescent City's finest players.

She says she loves New Orleans because it has the same sultry climate as her ancestral village in Italy. On this album, she's never

sounded more at home.

Kyle Alden: It's one thing to have the intellectual idea to write songs inspired by the poems of William Butler Yeats, It's quite another to have the musical talent and songwriting ability to pull it

San Anselmo singersongwriter Alden succeeds on all those levels with "Songs from Yeats' Bee-Loud Glade," setting to music a collection of 13 poems by the revered Irish poet and playwright. Yeats, who died in 1939, never sounded more alive.

Emily Bonn & The Vivants: Bonn grew up in Mill Valley, but she sounds like she comes from Memphis, Tenn., or Macon, Ga., on her rootsy debut CD, "Songs from Ala-bama Street." The young multi-instrumentalist plays guitar and banjo and sings in a laconic drawl that's as homespun as a gingham bonnet. She's been mentioned in the same breath as Gillian Welch, Neko Case and the Be Good Tanyas. On the strength of the seven engaging original songs on this auspicious first album of acoustic Americana, she deserves to be in that company.

Blame Sally: This allwoman Bay Area quartet takes the title of its sparkling new album, "Speeding Ticket and a Valentine," from a line in the lead-off single, "Living Without You," a buoyant pop rocker written by Mill Valley's Renee Harcourt.

This CD came along at an apex in the Bay Area band's 11-year career. It's the first release in a fiveyear, three-album, midsix-figure deal with Berkelev-based indie Ninth Street Opus, so look for more music from Harcourt and company in 2012. Meanwhile, this album showcases the multiple styles and personalities of a band that has become a success by staying true to itself.

Gayan Macher: On his San Francisco Zen Center bio, longtime Marin County Sufi teacher Macher never even mentions that he's a singer-songwriter with this soul-stirring CD, "Stay Awake With Me, to his credit. That may have to do with spiritual modesty, the suppression of ego, but this album of seven of Macher's original songs is something to be proud of, Press Play's sleeper hit of the year.

Macher, who lives in Fairfax, writes poemsongs in the tradition of mystical poets like Rumi and Rilke, managing to invoke what he calls "the inner lover" without being preachy or saccharine or clichéd, and that's rare for music in the spiritual genre.
